Cognitive development is a way of addressing the way a child learns to think, reason, and use language, which are vital to the child's overall growth and development.¹¹ Traditionally, health professionals have based their interventions with children on the stages of cognitive development described by Jean Piaget (1896–1980).¹² Piaget's theory is a logical, deductive explanation of how children think from infancy through adolescence.

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
