After that, we examine research that links the contextual aspects of Bronfenbrenner's theory to proximal processes, and ultimately, children's socioemotional development. In its earliest inception, Urie Bronfenbrenner's ecological model (Bronfenbrenner, 1977b, 1979) gave prominence of place to the environment and divided an individual's environment into nested and interrelated systems: the microsystem, mesosystem,

macrosystem, and exosystem.
